PURPOSE OF SHOWING

As breed in development, it's important we evaluate the Lykos Wolfalike bloodlines and breed, as well as get together to showcase our beautiful dogs!

As an inclusive and fun community of dog lovers, we know that every dog is the 'best dog' for their families at the end of the day!

Dog showing is usually a competitive sport, but our show is a fun competition with a community atmosphere where everyone can learn and have fun.

Dogs are judged on their conformation (physical bodily structure and size), their gait/movement and other attributes such as as coat colour and eye colour etc. When we judge our dogs, we assess all their qualities and faults according to the Lykos **Breed Standard**.

A **Breed Standard** in dogs is a 'blue print' of how a breed should look, move, behave and be proportioned.



LYKOS WOLFALIKE BREED STANDARD

General Appearance: Medium bone and athletic in appearance. Slightly longer than tall, with legs slightly longer than overall depth of body.

Elbows: Close fitting to the chest

Chest: Medium chest, not broad.

Body: Level topline with smoothly sloping croup

Head: Not too broad. Slightly domed skull. Medium stop. Strong muzzle that is long and gently tapering.

Lips: close fitting and always dark. Nose must be black.

Eyes: Almond shaped, forward facing and set at a slightly oblique angle. Brown, yellow, amber and blue accepted.

Bite: Scissor Bite

Ears: Set fairly high, not too large. Must be erect. Wide-set ears or ears too large are considered a fault.

Neck: Strong and muscular.

Shoulders: Moderately sloping, broad and fairly short but not steep. Long tail reaching the hock.

Tail: carried down when standing and may be lifted when excited.

Medium-long hocks.

Feet: Oval. Rear dewclaws must be removed within 3 days of birth if possible. Toenails of black or white or mixture of both.

Fore feet: Pasterns strong

Coat: Dense double coat, soft in texture. Plush in appearance. Long coats permitted. Well defined ruff and breaches. Bushy tail.

Gait: Smooth, far reaching ground covering gait.

Size at Wither:

Dogs 55-65 cms, 30-40 kgs.

Bitches 55-65cms, 25-35kgs.

Balance is more important than size.

Colour: Any shade of red, grey, sable/agouti or black with white. Dark masks must cover most of the face, in particular a darker bar down the middle of the face. White faces without mask are not desired unless the dog is mostly white or solid white. All colours should mimic naturally occurring true wolf colours

Temperament: Never unnecessarily reactive or or timid. Friendly and laid back.



SHOW PREPARATION



MAKE SURE YOUR DOG IS CLEAN & WELL GROOMED & LOOKING ITS BEST! BRING A BRUSH IF YOU NEED TO!



BRING YOUR DOG'S FAVOURITE HIGH-VALUE TREATS (IN A TREAT POUCH/BUM BAG). LEASH, FLAT COLLAR OR EVEN BETTER, A SLIP LEASH THAT CAN ACT AS A COLLAR AND LEASH ALL IN ONE. IF POSSIBLE, DON'T SHOW YOUR DOG IN A HARNESS OR HEADCOLLAR/HALTI



IT'S GOING TO BE A WARM DAY, SO ENSURE YOU & YOUR DOG STAY HYDRATED. TAPS & BATHROOM FACILITIES ARE AT THE PARK



(OPTIONAL) COLLAPSIBLE CHAIR, SNACKS, A CRATE IF YOU THINK IT WILL BE EASIER TO MANAGE



WEAR SOMETHING COMFORTABLE & CONSERVATIVE. SLACKS/LEGGINGS, BLOUSE/SHIRT/NICE TOP IS TYPICAL SHOW ATTIRE. COMFY SHOES ARE A MUST. NICE RUNNERS ARE FINE!

It's a good idea to arrive a little bit early to settle your dog and get them used to the environment. Go for a little walk around the lake and let them have a sniff around.

When you arrive collect your tag with your exhibit number from the desk to clip on to your arm. Please return the tags after the show concludes.

All dogs are required to be on leash at Basterfield Park. To make your lives easier, don't engage too much with other dogs on leash as your dog will be harder to focus and control when you need them to! While you are waiting for your class, you can get your dog into a focussed mindset by doing some basic obedience with your dog.



SHOWING INFO

All entrants are in the same boat, so please don't feel any pressure about what you need to do! This is all new for most people, but our friendly judge or club organisers will help by explaining what you need to do before the show starts.

We are just happy that you are coming along to this very special event and involved in our community!

The information in this show catalogue should also explain what to expect, but if you ever have any questions, just ask one of our friendly committee members present on the day. No matter what place your dog gets in the show, everyone will go home with something!

We highly value your support and dedication to your dogs and our community!



ORDER OF JUDGING

All classes run as per the Show Catalogue. There are ribbons for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place.

The winners of each DOG (male) class compete against the winners of each BITCH (female) class.

The next step is a class to determine the **BEST IN SHOW** and **RUNNER UP TO BEST IN SHOW** out of all winners (in **dark blue** above right).

Those dogs come back into the ring (except the Baby Puppy) and are judged together to compete for **BEST IN SHOW** and **RUNNER UP TO BEST IN SHOW**.



BEST IN SHOW and **RUNNER UP TO BEST IN SHOW** are then awarded a rosette each.

SHOWING YOUR DOG

As you can see from the catalogue listing, all males will be shown first. When all the males have had their class, the females will be shown. Classes go in order of age, with younger puppies first.

Due to numbers in our breed, we show entire (non-desexed) dogs alongside desexed dogs.


When waiting for your class, try to keep your dog settled and calm. If your dog is a bit too excited, feel free to take them around for a walk around to sniff things and do some basic obedience work, but not too far so you can hear if your number gets called out.

Each dog will be called in individually one at a time when it is your turn.

You will be asked to **(1)** trot in a line (up and back), **(2)** in a triangle, then **(3)** in a large circle. The judge will tell you if they want to see a walk and/or a trot.


After this, make your dog stand in a square stance, with their focus on you! If they sits just stand them up.

UP AND BACK



This means running straight away from the judge, turning and running straight back, pulling gently up into a natural stance about six feet from the judge with your dog standing side-on so the judge can see your dog from its side. If your dog breaks into a gallop the judge cannot assess the gait, and it is probably because you are running the dog too fast. If necessary, take your dog back and start again. Moving off slowly helps.

MOVING IN A TRIANGLE




The triangle is so the judge can see your dog in 3 different profiles.

You always start from where ever the judge is standing.


Start with your dog on your left hand side and head off to the right. If your dog was on the right hand side, you would be obstructing the judges view of your dog.

CIRCLE (AROUND)

This means running straight away from the judge, turning and running straight back, pulling gently up into a natural stance about six feet from the judge with your dog standing side-on so the judge can see your dog from its side. If your dog breaks into a gallop the judge cannot assess the gait, and it is probably because you are running the dog too fast. If necessary, take your dog back and start again. Moving off slowly helps. After the circle, stand your dog for the judge to view it side-on.



STAND YOUR DOG



STANCE / "STACK"

Start to get your dog in position for the judge to look over your dog. Make the best of your dog - stand ('stack') them squarely, with their front legs straight and the hocks of his back legs parallel 90 degrees to the ground. Try to make your dog look alert, but keep your dog under control. If your dog sits, just stand them back up again into a stand. Even while you are in the ring while the other entrants are moving around, stand your dog out of the way and keep practising the stand.

Remember, if you bring your hand up your dog will most likely sit, so have the treat in front of your dog to lure it into a stand.






Show Etiquette: If possible, it's always nice to shake hands after your class and congratulate your fellow dog lovers and 'competitors'!



MOVING IN THE RING

INCORRECT

In dog shows, “pacing” means when the legs on the same side of the body move together. This is incorrect and often penalised gait. “Pacing” can be often corrected by running the dog a bit faster.



CORRECT

This is trotting, the desired gait for the show ring. Reach and extension are terms you hear often in dog show circles. This refers to the dog's front legs reaching and the rear legs extending when the dog is at a trot.
